Summer 2012: A crescendo of new sounds connects with audiences across the region

Inder the guidance and direction of new Artistic Director Gil Rose, Monadnock Music recently completed its 47th season. Rose joined the organization last February with stellar experience under his belt, having worked as artistic director for both Boston Modern Orchestra Project and Opera Boston. "Programming, rehearsing and performing music for my first season at Monadnock Music was a singular thrill," states Gil Rose. "It all happened so quickly, but the memories will stay with me for a long time. I look forward to future programs and memories yet imagined."

"I'm really very proud of everyone who worked to make this Festival happen, especially Gil and our Trustees" says Executive Director William Chapman. This season Monadnock Music provided guests with new and diverse offerings. Highlights included Copland's *Appalachian Spring* with the Monadnock Sinfonietta, Schubert's Winterreise with baritone Sanford Sylvan, and the return of opera to Monadnock Music.

Considered one of the biggest highlights of the season by Chapman, the two chamber operas by Dominick Argento – "The Boor" and "A Water Bird Talk" – made a bold statement. "It's different in scale from anything Monadnock Music has done in more than a decade,"

Chapman said. "It's great when you hear belly laughs coming from the audience. It doesn't get better than that."

are endless" Violinist Gabriela Diaz, of the newly formed Monadnock Quartet and several Boston-based ensembles, finds the enthusiasm of the audiences refreshing. "You know your audience is coming with expectations of having a great listening experience", says Diaz. "You feel like you are playing for people who really want to be there, which made performing here such a thrill".

The smaller venues, used for Village Concerts, allowed for a more intimate and engaging experience. Concert-goers and performers alike got to mingle at receptions after the concerts. "The Peterborough Town House was perfect for larger productions," says Chapman. "Village Concerts enable us to explore the
